- Mr. Williams- would like Council to address speeding throughout Borough. His dog who was the victim of a hit-and-run driver recently.

4. Mayor's Report

- Mentioned two high profile deaths in Yeadon, Henry Toma and John Smith.
- Comcast Cares day on May 4, 2019. Thanked all that participated.
- Yeadon Community took place on May 4, 2019 as well, and was hosted by State Reps. Joanna McClinton and Margo Davidson.

5. President's Report:

- Attended multiple community events over the weekend.
 - o Comcast cares, Community Day, YEAA program, Nile program
- Ms. Helmandollar, Arthur Weisfeld, and Asher Kemp, of Friendship Circle and Senior Community Services, provided a brief synopsis of their programs
 - Yeadon was one of the first municipalities to provide financial support to the organization and has been doing so for the past 42 years.
 - o Serve nearly 20,000 people with their services.
 - 42 individuals receive intensive in-home care services. Helps people stay in their own home. Also has a handyman service, which helps seniors do repairs to their home.
 - Has 4 senior centers in the county. Is the oldest and largest senior center in Delaware County.
 - Server over 6,300 meals just from the center, doesn't include the meals they deliver.
 - September 23, 2017 was the Arthur Weisfield day in the Borough of Yeadon.
 - Distribute \$20 fruit and vegetable vouchers every Friday beginning in June.

6. Borough Manager's Report:

- Conducted job interviews for Public Works open positions.
- Elevator Modernization bid was held 5/1/19 and a special meeting was held on 5/2/19 to discuss the bid and how upgrades would proceed. Council would like Tri-State to provide a timeline for the temporary fix and modernization. Also, Engineer is to get the contract to Tri-State by tomorrow.
- work along side the existing tank. Was discussed to look at the capital budget and get three (3) quotes for replacement or additional systems.
- The Library states that their basement floods when it rains, would like the Borough to assist with this.

7. Solicitor Report:


- Had discussions with the Historical Commission. Commission must now figure out how to cluster their historically identified properties into one district.

 - Five officers are going to a five-day detective school next week.
 - Borough is doing well crime wise. Believes this is due to more visibility of officers.
 - Will put speed signs around the borough and consider other speed calming devices to address issue of speeding in the Borough.
