10. ENGINEER'S REPORT – (Erin Porter)

Regarding the Keystone Grant - The bid opening for the Library's HVAC System was on 7/17/19 at 9:30 a.m. with 1 bid from LGB Mechanical in the amount of \$132,740. The architect's estimate for the HVAC replacement is \$45 - \$55,000. NDI recommends that the Borough reject the offer from LGB Mechanical and rebid. The opening bid for the Library's window and lighting replacement has been extended to 7/31/19 at 9:30 a.m. due to no bid offers received.

Note: Finance Director, Nafis Nichols, reminded Council and NDI that the Keystone Grant expires 12 months after commencement; the bidding requires immediate attention.

- 728 Yeadon Avenue an RFQ (Request for Quote) has been sent to 3 potential bidders for the emergency stabilization; no replies have been made. The bids are due 7/25/19. In order to expedite the process, NDI requested to authorize the award to the lowest responsible bidder if the amount is under \$21,600. Note: Solicitor Charles M. Gibbs Esq. said a Special Meeting can be scheduled, as needed.
- Stormwater Tip: Plants of all kinds help reduce stormwater runoff from residential properties. Their roots absorb water and break up and aerate the soil as they grow. Flowering native perennials will attract beneficial predators and pollinator birds, butterflies and other insects. Perennials also develop extensive root systems to hold and enrich the soil. Monitor the plants for pests and control them with environmentally friendly applications or use plain water to avoid contaminating water runoff with chemicals that endanger the streams.

 - ❖ No Zoning Hearing for the month of June.

❖ The zoning request was approved by the Zoning Board. There were four zoning use applications: 716 Church Lane and 459 Industrial Drive for signed permits. 707 Union Avenue wants to install a deck. 6 West Providence Road wants to put a shed on the property.

III. **HOT SPOTS**

- ❖ Refer to the Engineer's Report concerning 728 and 1011 Yeadon Avenue.
- ❖ A law firm submitted a request to put a church in a commercial property on the 400 block of Penn Street.
- Request to put a church at 433 South Lansdowne Avenue.

IV. ACTION ITEMS

- ❖ The Code Department is awaiting the replacement of a vehicle for Borough use. As discussed with the Borough Manager, a new vehicle will be added onto next year's budget.
- Reports from the MyCivic App are being received by the Code Department.
- ❖ Forrest Creek Apartments on 300 North Front Street, has made several false fire alarms to the Yeadon Fire and Police Stations. The apartment complex is violating Borough Code #68-8 for False Alarms. The apartment complex will be fined for the false alarms that are being responded to.
- ❖ Regarding rear driveways Residents have been misinformed that the Borough owns the driveways, when in fact, it is the property owner's responsibility. The Code Department is providing information to residents on how to find information to repairing issues with the driveways.
- ❖ The Yeadon Borough Code Book is outdated and needs to be revised.
- ❖ Reports were made for 215 Elder Avenue concerning parked cars on the lawn and possibly running a business out of the home. The homeowner runs an appliance business in Philadelphia, at times he will bring his work home. Currently there is no Borough ordinance stated if a resident can/cannot store items at their residence. The cars have been removed.
- ❖ Yard Sales There are no Borough ordinances regarding yard sales. Residents can sell items on their property without obtaining a license. The Code Department recommends creating an ordinance to obtain a license in order to have a yard sale.
- ❖ The Nile Swim Clubs inquired about having fireworks for the Fourth of July. They were informed that if they decided to use commercial fireworks, a permit is required. They did not submit a permit.

V. UPCOMING ITEMS

- ❖ As per the Solicitor's motion regarding 421 and 419 Lansdowne Avenue; the Code Department is awaiting the contractor's construction plans to move forward.
- ❖ Stormwater Management Plans need to be submitted from the property owners to the Borough Engineer for the following properties in order to build a house: 47 49 Lincoln Avenue; the lot at Providence Road and Union Avenue.
- ❖ Property Abatements 2019 total is \$7,420.53.
- ❖ The Code Department Revenue total is \$18,969.28.
- ❖ The Code Workload: 108 violation notices; 15 retail inspections; 35 rental inspections; 3 court cases; 1 fire investigation; 4 contractors registered; 37 building permits; 4 electrical permits; 5 plumbing permits; 7 mechanical permits; 1 zoning inspection; 3 street openings; 1 dumpster; 4 zoning use applications; 1 handicap permit.

Solicitor, Charles M. Gibbs Esq. – Pursuant to the Robert's Rules of Order which establishes the Borough Councils authority to conduct its business is limited without the presence of a quorum. Currently, the Council does not have a quorum. It is recommended that Council recess this meeting for another date and time when a quorum is established. Absent is a pending Block Party Application that Council cannot act on at this time.

DISCUSSION

Councilor Rafi Cave – Attendance at the Borough Council Meetings are an elected official's duty. Residents attend the meetings more regularly than the most Council members. It is too regular that Councilors dismiss their duties by not showing up to the meeting.

President LaToya Monroe – Information regarding the attendance of the Borough Council meeting should be made known to the community. The President has asked that our Borough Newsletters include Council attendance and voting records so the community can understand who has their interest best at heart. Phone calls were received from Councilor McCabe and Vice President Francis informing of their absence in attending tonight's meeting. Councilor Jones-Waters did not indicate that she needed to leave the meeting early, otherwise the ceremonial events could have been moved to the end of the meeting in order to conduct the business of the Borough. The President is thankful that the Accounts Payable List passed vote, if not, every person that works for the Borough would not have been able to receive payment for their hard work.
