# Development is Just a Small Part of Building Yeadon

Dear Neighbors,

A little less than two years ago, this Council began the process of trying to bring much needed new development to the Borough. After working with Borough Management and Council, we granted a conditional use to

Grace Court to construct a sister building called Makemie Court. In this era of COVID-19 and civil unrest, I am ecstatic to announce that the Pennsylvania Housing Finance Authority has authorized tax credits in excess of \$1.2 million dollars for the new construction of a four-story building, consisting of 44 one-bedroom units for seniors age 55 and above and persons with special needs. There will be twelve accessible units. Additionally, twelve units will have rental subsidy assistance. The development is estimated to be a total of 41,552 square feet.

It's been a long time, too long, since we've seen new major construction in Yeadon. We've searched our archives and cannot figure out when the last major development in our Borough was. We've seen the wrecking ball tear down our movie theater and now is the time to watch a construction crane come in and build beautiful homes for our neighbors. This is not the end. This is the beginning. Makemie Court will not be a ONE OFF. As a Council and as a Borough it is vitally important that we make strategic investments and welcome development while protecting our beloved community. I am proud

that Makemie Court will provide seniors who want to transition from homeownership to a senior community won't have to leave this Borough. As we move forward, we will work with the tools we have, tax credits, tax abatements, and any other assistance possible to continue to BUILD Yeadon.

Now more than ever, our small Borough is showing our neighbors how big our hearts are. In this era of discord, let us remember that while new buildings are important but it is the personal contact that we have with each other that really makes Yeadon a home.

I would remiss not to mention that the Council is working with the Mayor and Police Chief to ensure that our Police Department's policies reflect our values. We have witnessed too many times the killing of a black person by their government. George Floyd. Breonna Taylor. Stephon Clark. Botham Jean. Philando Castile. We will remember these names and all of the names as we work to make sure that Black Lives Matter in Yeadon Borough.

From the Mayor's Desk

# A Word of Encouragement in a Most Challenging Time

Dear Fellow Yeadonites,

I want to take this time to reassure our residents, while providing a brief update concerning Public Safety. We face continuing challenges everyday regarding traffic, speeding and quality of life crimes, as we continually work on addressing these issues – many of which remain a work in progress. Notwithstanding, I do want to take this time to let residents know how we did during the civil unrest this summer and what things may look like along those lines within the immediate future.

During the civil unrest, a mayoral curfew was called for during the week of the riots. As a result, immediately south of us in South West Philadelphia, neighborhoods and businesses were ransacked and upended, with many of them left boarded up. Immediately north of us, a similar result occurred in Upper Darby. Some of these agitators travelled through Yeadon to wreak havoc directly around us. But thankfully, all we experienced was one broken glass in the business district, but due to the diligence of our police officers, strategic planning and placement to mitigate these impending riots, Yeadon was largely spared.

However, we do face an impending challenge before us as we move forward. The national dialogue has conspired to suppress voting, while eliciting fear and intimidation at the polls - especially in blue states and high democratic



leaning municipalities like Yeadon. Consequently, I want our residents to know, that in these unprecedented times of upheaval, we will not succumb to fear and intimidation as the rule of the day. Therefore, we are marshalling all public safety resources to ensure that our residents will be able to get to the polls and cast their ballots without fear or intimidation - whether you vote by mail or in person.

So, when this newsletter is published, we would either be in the process of actually voting, or we would have just finished voting. Notwithstanding, the unprecedented nature of pushback leading to violence that we are witnessing around the country, cannot be underestimated - as we are seeing vigilante groups conspiring to take over governments and whole neighborhoods in the name of nationalism. We are living in a day where things are no longer sacred or sacrosanct. As a result, every effort is being made

so that immediately before, during, and after this consequential election, Yeadon residents can feel safe and comforted that their votes will count, their voices heard, and their neighborhood will continue to be kept safe; and that we will continue to remain ahead of the curve in delivering overall safety for Yeadon residents in the most trying of times when we may again be tested in an unprecedented manner.

Therefore, I want to take this time to thank all our residents and encourage you to cast your ballots and take part of our civic duties so that we can in the words of Abraham Lincoln (at the end of his Gettysburg Address), promise to deliver "...a government of the people, by the people and for the people..." so that our democracy and quality of life, will not perish from the earth."

#### From the Chief of Police

# The Murder of George Floyd





The following was a post on Nextdoor that I wrote shortly after the murder of George Floyd, for those not on social media I wanted to share with you what I shared with those on Nextdoor and Facebook.

Beforehand, though, I wanted to ensure all of my Yeadon Family, and those who may work, or visit this Delaware County gem, that I am not one to think status quo is ever good enough. I do everything I can to ensure that the police services rendered for you are both professional and outstanding. With that said, know your police officers are trained often, educated on defusing hostile situations, use of force, positional asphyxia, excited delirium, mental health issues, and so much more; as well as briefed daily on situations across the Country and locally that affect the police and community relationships. Officers are sent on patrol with the mindset that everyone is to be treated with respect and dignity. I ask that you remember that we are human, we will make mistakes, myself included, and to work towards stopping senseless acts by police officers I have instituted a "Duty to Intervene and Act" Policy, which demands that an officer not only intervene in an act of criminality or unethical behavior, but also render aid to anyone who immediately needs medical attention, not waiting for an ambulance to arrive. I'm not done making the changes needed and building connections to ensure you have trust in us; so know I'm listening, I want your feedback, both positive and negative. Together we can keep the bonds strong that we have here, and continue to look out for one another, and be the shining light of policing into the future. I will not settle for nothing less, because you deserve nothing less.

Stay safe out there.

My thoughts and prayers are with the Floyd family, and while I have commented on my Twitter account, I wanted to reach out to you here so you would have no doubt where I stand on this senseless act in which a life was taken that was nothing but homicide. The day I watched the video, I literally got sick at what I saw. Yeadon Mayor Hepkins happened to call me right after I saw it and could tell from my voice, I was troubled. He asked if I was good, and I replied no I'm not, I'm literally sick to my stomach and described the video for him. We talked. I made the comment that we cannot begin to succeed at policing until we (police) police ourselves. I immediately sent this video out to all members of the Yeadon Police Department, and it was discussed at length with the officers, and I can tell you they were sickened by the video as much as I was.

I want to tell you that I would not need an attorney to tell me what I saw was a murder with malice, and an arrest would have been made that same day. I have been a police officer for 35 years, and there are no training or tactics I have ever had that say its ok to inflict force on the neck or other areas of the body that could result in death unless it is a deadly force situation and you are fighting for your life or trying to save someone else's life. THIS WAS NOT A DEADLY FORCE SITUATION. This was beyond wrong. This was a homicide. This was murder. Four days to an arrest was wrong, and I'm sorry everyone had to wait, and hope it wasn't going to be ignored.

The officers who watched and

failed to intervene, who failed to render aid, who continued to apply pressure to any part of his body as he went limp, and the officer who

could see all of this, and ignored George's pleas and those of witnesses to help him, are all culpable. They failed as cops, failed at just being human. It's not about being weak on the street. Strength, real strength and courage sometimes comes with stopping an officer who has lost sight of what they have taken their oath for.

Since my arrival here in Yeadon, I have instituted Racial Intelligence and Diversity Training, De-Escalation Training, have trained officers as negotiators, have instituted less lethal training and devices for patrol, and have written an Unbiased Policing Policy. I am also writing a new policy "Failure to Intervene" policy and directive, so there is no question about the thought process of your

officers in this Department. We have a Citizens Police Academy, Youth Police Academy, Chaplain Program, a Police/Community Garden planned, and a greater connection to our youth in the schools, and so many other community policing programs to connect us together because we can't succeed without your support. Yeadon Police have also teamed with the LOVE is the Answer, Walking While Black Organization, in which we now have other police departments in PA asking us for guidance. We were the only police agency in PA that joined this endeavor that I am aware of, of which I am proud, because we are not afraid to be different and prove it.

I instill in this department that every person is a human being and deserves respect. I am not soft on crime, and some may not like my tenacity, but I will not abuse or allow officers to abuse citizens because that citizen may have committed a crime. The officers get that. They have embraced that philosophy, and really care about this community. Will we make mistakes? Yes, including myself, because we are human. BUT your officers, Yeadon's Officers, are not afraid to step in and stop an officer who may be doing something wrong or report it. They get that it's not about being weak, they get it's about doing the right thing. I am proud of them all for seeing that policing to me is more than just arresting people.

If you haven't really seen what we do here I ask you to please take a look at what we are doing that is truly different. Take a ride-along with me or any officer. See for your-

self the dedication and purpose we have to serve and protect this community. We do a lot more than you think, and we hear you, we see you.

I wish there was a real way for me to say I understand your pain, but I can't really ever understand that pain because I am not black. I want to, believe me I do, but that doesn't do it justice to say that. I feel it, I see it, but I am not sure I am really finding the right words there as well, or if there are even any real words to grasp that thought. Know we, good cops think about it, we don't ignore it.

I will tell you incidents like what happened in Minneapolis pain me too, they pain good cops, because that can't be the narrative in which we live, that can't be the narrative in which any person, regardless of color can ever believe that that is a true reflection of every police officer. Yeadon Police are not that reflection, I promise you we are truly something different. We and good cops are profoundly different. We

I pray that God keeps us all safe, and real change happens.

# **Important Dates and More from Yeadon Public Works**

#### **PUBLIC WORKS DEPARTMENT**

Public Works Hours are 7 a.m. to 4 p.m. Monday to Friday beginning October 9, 2020. To report a Public Works related issue please dial (610)-623-3636.

**REMINDER:** If you're calling about a sewer problem, please dial 911.

#### **LEAF SEASON**

Leaf season runs from Monday, October 12th through the last week of December. The leaf machine will follow the same route as the street sweeper. Residents are asked to rake their leaves to the curb, not in the street. Public Works will then rake the leaves from curb into the machine. Please be reminded that no trash, twigs, or branches are to be put in with leaves. Any piles of leaves containing these items will be left at curb. The county dump inspectors will not permit leaves to be dumped that contain debris mixed in with the leaves, so please make sure to separate any debris from leaves. We thank you for your cooperation.

#### **E-WASTE COLLECTION EVENT CANCELLED**

The Electronic Waste event for Saturday, October 17th, 2020 is cancelled.

#### YARD WASTE COLLECTION

The final Yard Waste collection days will be held on Friday September 11th, 2020 and Friday October 9th, 2020. All residents will be able to bring their yard waste to the Public Works Garage for disposal. Yard Waste is defined as the following: shrubberxy, tree trimmings, and branches. The diameter on the tree branches should be no wider than 4 inches and bundles no more than 3 feet long. Grass clippings or leaves will not be accepted. Hours for dumping are 8 a.m. to 12 p.m. and 1p.m. To 3 p.m. No contractors, landscapers, or tree companies are permitted to dump. EVERYONE MUST FIRST STOP AT OFFICE AND MUST WEAR PROPER COVID-19 PPE. If what you are dumping is not in compliance with Act 101, you will be turned away.

There will be NO COLLECTION on the following 2020 holidays:

**Thanksgiving:** Thursday, November 26th; Revised pickup Friday, November 27th

**Christmas:** Friday, December 25th; Revised pickup Monday, December 28th

\*\*Recycling pickup occurs throughout the Borough on Wednesdays all year-round. \*\*

#### **BULK TRASH COLLECTION**

To arrange pick up of "white goods" large items such as washing machines, dryers, refrigerators, freezers and hot water heaters (remove or secure doors) please call the Public Works Department at 610-623-3636. Any items containing Freon will include a \$10 charge which must be paid on the 3rd floor of the Borough Hall before being picked up (Due to Covid-19 please contact the borough building in regards to payment)

Other household items such as sofas, beds, and furniture can be placed out for regular trash collection but is limited to one large item per trash collection. Rugs must be rolled and tied and be put out for regular collection. Mattresses and box springs MUST be encased in a plastic industrial bag.

# **Delaware County Reopening Plan Enters Green Phase**

On June 26th Delaware County has move to the green phase of Governor Wolf's phased reopening plan. What does this mean? The overall rate of people contracting COVID-19 has reduced and things can operate "normally". Businesses can reopen and people can return to work so long as public safety is prioritized. Recently, Governor Wolf and Secretary of Health, Rachel Levine issued a Targeted Mitigation Order on July 16th because of a slight rise in COVID-19 cases. Below is a list of restrictions that can be found on the governor's website at www.governor.pa.gov, which are strongly encouraged:

- Work remotely (if possible)
- Masks must be worn when leaving your home
- Businesses reopening must follow the updated Business and Building Safety Requirements

- Businesses can operate at 75% capacity, except for restaurants and bars
- Child care may open complying with guidance
- Schools are subject to open per the CDC and Commonwealth's guidance
- Large gatherings of more than 250 prohibited
- Restaurants and bars can open at 50% capacity (as per September 21st order)
- Nightclubs are prohibited from conducting operations

Anyone coming into the Borough will have to wear a mask and maintain six feet of space from others. Remember to wash your hands regularly and thoroughly with soap and water for at least 20 seconds or use hand sanitizer (containing at least 60% alcohol), cover your mouth and nose when sneezing/coughing with a tissue or use the

inside of your elbow. Also, stay at home if you have symptoms of the virus.

DO NOT enter the Borough if you are having coronavirus symptoms, such as a fever, cough, sneeze, loss of taste, etc., or if you have been in contact with someone who has tested positive or suspected to be positive.

Please be advised that the event hall rentals are suspended. For everyone's safety, the basket-ball courts at the Yeadon Community Park will remain closed. Please be mindful and compliant of the posted signs. Bear in mind that these orders can change daily and to keep up on this information through reliable news sources and websites.

# Serve Up Fire Safety in the Kitchen

The Yeadon Fire Company is teaming up with the National Fire Protection Association® (NFPA®) – the official sponsor of Fire Prevention Week for more than 90 years –to promote this year's Fire Prevention Week campaign, "Serve Up Fire Safety in the Kitchen!" According to NFPA, cooking is the leading cause of home fires and home fire injuries in the United States. Almost half (44%) of reported home fires started in the kitchen. Two-thirds (66%) of home cooking fires start with the ignition of food or other cooking materials.

"The most important step you should take before making a meal is to 'Serve Up Fire Safety in the Kitchen!' said Chief Michael Diienno, "a cooking fire can grow quickly. I have seen many homes damaged and people injured by fires that could easily have been prevented."

Yeadon Fire Company wants to share safety tips to keep you from having a cooking fire.


- Never leave cooking food unattended. Stay in the kitchen while you are frying, grilling or broiling. If you have to leave, even for a short time, turn off the stove.
- If you are simmering, baking, roasting, or boiling food, check it regularly, remain in the home while food is cooking, and use a timer to remind you that you're cooking.
- You must be alert when cooking. You won't be alert if you are sleepy, have taken medicine or drugs, or consumed alcohol that makes you drowsy.
- Always keep an oven mitt and pan lid nearby when you're cooking. If a small grease fire starts, slide the lid over the pan to smother the flame. Turn off the burner, and leave the pan covered until it is completely cool.
- Have a "kid-free zone" of at least 3 feet around the stove and areas where hot food or drink is prepared or carried.

# The Spotted Lanternfly: Help Control This Invasive Pest



The Spotted Lanternfly is an invasive insect that can potentially damage crops, plants, and trees. Currently, Delaware County is being quarantined for this species. These plant hoppers are now in their adult stage and we may continue to see them well into the winter season. The Pennsylvania Agriculture Department and Penn State have collaborated to study these insects in order to eliminate them. Below are a few things you can do to help if you see spotted lanternflies.

**Identify and Report Sightings.** Go to /extension.psu.edu/spotted-lanternfly for information about identifying the insect and reporting any sightings.

**Inspect vehicles**, trailers, and any items stored outside that will be transported. Also, try to avoid parking under trees.

**Elimination.** Help eliminate spotted lanternflies by:

- Scraping the eggs
- Squishing the nymph to adult flies.
- Insecticides. Penn State are conducting test to see which insecticides work best. Please take caution when using any insecticide and be aware of any runoff that can go into the stormwater sewers. Only use insecticides that are registered by the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA). Avoid home remedies as it can be harmful to animals, plants, and humans.
- Use tree traps for a non-toxic way to catch and eliminate these insects. However, avoid attaching tape to trees as this can catch other non-threatening insects and animals.

As the fall season approaches, the spotted lanternflies will start to lay eggs. According to Penn State the egg masses will start to be visible on trees (and outdoor items such as lawn chairs). So come this winter be prepared to scrape some spotted lanternfly eggs.

#### Lieutenant

Lieutenants have many of the same responsibilities as lower ranking police officers, but also plan work schedules, oversee departmental cases, book and process criminals, assist with detective work, conduct internal investigations, and help officers with situations that require seniority or expertise in the field.

#### Detective

Primarily Investigate criminal acts such as homicides, sexual assaults, armed robberies, home invasions, and property crimes such as burglaries. Collect and use forensic evidence to solve crimes. Interview informants, suspects, and witnesses to ascertain alibis, clues, time frames, and possible suspects. Keep detailed records.

#### Sergeant

Police Sergeants present the first line of supervisors in the police force. They perform all the duties of a police officer as well as supervise, coordinate, and guide police officers and other department employees in their daily activities.

Some of the primary duties are to protect life and property through the enforcement of laws & regulations; Proactively patrols assigned areas, responds to calls for police service, conducts preliminary & follow up criminal and traffic investigations, conducts interviews, prepares written reports and field notes of investigations and patrol activities, arrest and processes criminals and testifies in court.
