

Bettering the Borough

Grant Projects for Yeadon Borough

1. Community Park Improvements

Improvements to the Community Park will include new playground structures, swing sets, grills, picnic tables, a pavilion, team benches and associated improvements. Additionally a walking trail will be added with upgrades to the basketball courts and rain garden. This project is about rehabilitating and upgrading the existing park. In a second phase of the project an additional grant was received for a second basketball/pickleball court.

Grant Monies Awarded: \$405,660.50

2. Cypress Street Sanitary Sewer Rehabilitation

Sanitary Sewer Improvements to Cypress Street from Longacre Blvd to Baily Road. The improvements include the replacement of approximately 350 linear feet of sanitary sewer main and 13 sewer laterals, the rehabilitation of 2 manholes, the resurfacing of 1,000 square yards of cart way and related site restoration.

Grant Monies Awarded: \$200,000


3. Duff Avenue Reconstruction

This project includes the reconstruction of Duff Avenue, between Callahan Avenue and Stetser Avenue.

Grant Monies Awarded: \$181,450

4. West Cobbs Parkway Infrastructure

Improvements Improvements will include the installation of concrete medians to provide traffic calming, ADA (American Disability Act) compliant curb cut ramps and crosswalks, striping, as well as resurfacing the roadway, and redesigning the traffic signal at West Cobbs Creek Parkway and MacDade Boulevard. A curb bump out is to be installed at West Cobbs and MacDade to reduce the pedestrian travel distance across MacDade. Traffic signal and pedestrian improvements are proposed at the intersection of West Cobbs Creek



5. Sidewalk and ADA Ramp Improvements

Improvements will include the installation of approximately 43 ADA compliant curb cut ramps through the Borough with associated sidewalk improvements, crosswalk striping and resurfacing. The project locations include the West Cobbs Creek Parkway, Bailey Road in front of the Evans Elementary School and the intersection of Robin Road and Wycombe Avenue.

Grant Monies Awarded: \$188,751

6. MacDade Boulevard & Church Lane ADA and Signal Upgrade

Upgrade pedestrian accommodations and modernize signal equipment at MacDade Boulevard (SR 0013) and Church Lane (SR 0013). MacDade Boulevard upgrades to oneway approaching West Cobbs Creek Parkway with associated traffic calming.

Grant Monies Awarded: \$315,000

7. Blunston Run Stream Restoration

This portion of the stream has experienced extreme cutting and the banks have eroded and become extremely steep. This project aims to restore Blunston Run between Karen Drive and Allen Drive using instream habitat improvement structures, protecting the mature tree canopy, and enhancing vegetation in the area.

Grant Monies Awarded: \$260,015

8. Yeadon Library Windows and Doors

The replacement of windows and doors at the Yeadon Public Library. **Grant Monies Awarded: \$26,415**

9. Church Lane Business District Streetscape

Enhance the safety of the business district on Church Lane between Whitby Ave and Guenther Ave with traffic signal upgrades, crosswalks, and ADA ramps at each intersection.

Grant Monies Awarded: \$675,154

From the Chief of Police

Better Policing for a Better Yeadon

I wanted to take this opportunity to sincerely thank all the residents of Yeadon Borough. It has been a year since I was sworn in as the police chief of the Yeadon Borough Police Department. The Yeadon community has been extremely welcoming to me words cannot express my gratitude. In the past year, the department has grown by hiring seven full-time patrol officers and three part-time parking enforcement officers.

The YPD has officially begun the Accreditation process. What is accreditation? The Pennsylvania Chiefs of Police Association introduced the Pennsylvania Law Enforcement Accreditation Program (PLEAC) in July 2001. PLEAC is a progressive and time-proven strategy that helps law enforcement agencies evaluate and improve their performance. With over 375 enrolled agencies and 149 currently accredited agencies, PLEAC sets a credible framework for excellence in law enforcement in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania.

Why is Police Accreditation important? The U.S. Department of Justice (DOJ) & COPS Office support agency accreditation and rec-

ognize the importance of adhering to the highest standards of police policies and operations. The community benefits when its law enforcement personnel are following standardized policies and procedures that provide efficient, effective, and fair policing. Accreditation of agencies helps to ensure accountability and transparency that can enhance confidence and trust in law enforcement among the communities they serve.

The accreditation process is separated into a three-part process. The YPD is currently in the first stage of the process. The first stage of accreditation is application, enrollment, and evaluation of current policies and the development of new policies. The second process of accreditation is the internal review and self-assessment of the police department. The third and final

process is a formal assessment by trained PA Chiefs of police assessors. The accreditation process can take approximately 12 months to 24 months to complete.


Crime alert and tips to avoid becoming a victim of car theft. Nationwide there has been an increase in auto thefts. Yeadon and the surrounding areas have not been immune to this trend. Shockingly a vehicle is stolen approximately every 32 seconds in the United States. Last year there were over 1 million cars stolen in the United States according to the National Crime Information Center. The leading vehicles that were targeted by thieves were Dodge muscle cars, closely followed by BMWs, Infinities, and Land Rovers as well as Ford and Dodge heavy-duty pickups. Also, the thefts of Kia increased by almost 800% and Hyundai thefts increased by more than 400% from 2019 to 2022. This increase in the thefts of Kias and Hyundais can be attributed to the TikTok car theft challenge.


Keeping your car safe: Tips for preventing auto theft. It goes without saying but, it must be repeated lock your doors. Keeping your vehicle locked is the first step in deterring a thief. Remove your keys from the vehicle. Never leave your keys in the ignition unattended. If your keys are left in the car a thief can simply break a window and drive it all. Never leave your car running, even to run into a store or to warm it up on a cold morning. Close the windows, keep your windows completely closed, a thief can simply reach in an open window, unlock your doors, and gain access to your vehicle. If possible, park in well-lit

Don't leave valuables in your car. One way to attract a thief is to leave a purse, cell phone, or other highvalue items that are visible in your car. Keep valuable items out of sight or secured in your trunk. Be alert and be aware of your surroundings when you park your car. If you are weary of the safety of your car or see someone loitering around, it's best to park somewhere else. The police department has free steering wheel locks for owners of Kia and Hyundai; they are available at the police station. If you become a victim of auto theft, please dial 911 immediately.

Code Enforcement Spotlight

Springtime Code Enforcement: Tips and Reminders

It's springtime and we all are glad the weather will be changing for the better and we all are glad that we will be able to get out and enjoy the good weather that should be coming. It also that time when we start to do spring cleaning. Most of us usually put things up for the winter and bring things out for the spring. Now is the time that some start to organize their yards, and others clean out the attic, basement or closets of things we don't need anymore. With that in mind, here are a few issues that the code department deals with each year around this time.

Trash issues. Under the code, all residents should be placing trash out in trash receptacles, and not trash bags. The Yeadon Borough Property maintenance minimum housing quality of life code.

SECTION 307 RUBBISH GARBAGE AND RECYCLABLES

Subsection 307.4 Approved rubbish and garbage container

An approved rubbish and garbage container (trash can) shall meet the following specification and shall be maintained as follows.

- A. Must be a leak proof metal or plastic container of not more than thirty three (33) gallon capacity with do not when filled with more than thirty pounds
- B. Shall be provided with close-fitting covers or lids for the storage of such material until properly disposed of.
- C. Shall effectively prevent the entry of rain, snow, vermin and vectors therein.

It that time when we all must maintain our lawns, and yards and under the borough Code Section

302.4 LAWN AND VEGETATION CARE

Your property area must be maintained free from grass, weeds or plant growth in excess of 10 inches (254 mm). That also includes around fences, poles, signs and sidewalk area.

There are concrete surfaces, sidewalks, walkway and driveways in the borough that need to be repaired or replaced. The code department is notifying the residents of the needed repairs under the Yeadon Borough Property Maintenance Minimum Housing Quality of life code.

SECTION 302.3.1 CONCRETE SURFACES.

Repairs shall be required for any concrete surface as followed:

A. Such surface pose a slip or tripping Hazard

B. If curbing has three (3) or more cracks in any 12 linear foot curb run

SECTION 302.3.2 PAVING AND OR BLACKTOP SURFACES

A. Such surface pose a slip or tripping Hazard

B. Such surfaces have (3) or more crack or dip, holes or craters

All properties are required by ordinance to have identification number 4 inches on the front and back of the properties which in care of a police, fire or medical emergency they know where the correct property is

304.3 PREMISES IDENTIFICATION

Building shall have approved address numbers placed in a position to be plainly legible and visible from the street or road fronting the property and from any common alley or public right of way servicing the rear of the property. There numbers shall contract with their background. Address numbers shall be Arabic numerals or alphabet letters, Numbers shall be a minimum of 4 inch (102mm) high with a minimum

stroke width of 0.5 inch (12.7mm) and must be plainly visible from the highway, street road or common alley.

SECTION 309 ANIMAL DEFECATION

Section 309.1 Accumulation of animal defecation and odor. The owner shall prevent or remove any and all animal waste, feces or execration on their property to eliminate an un healthy condition for the owner and the neighborhood.

The code department will be monitoring the above code ordinances and the other ordinances the borough have adopted. The code inspectors are here to provide borough residents and businesses with knowledge of what is in place to make our lives easy throughout the borough.

We are not here to cause any issues or problems, but to make sure that living in the Borough of Yeadon is an enjoyable community to call home.

Updates from the Social Security Administration

New Policies on Overpayments Announced

Social Security Commissioner Martin O'Malley recently announced new policies for the handling of overpayments. When someone is overpaid, SSA must try to recover those benefits. However, "doing so without regard to the larger purpose of the program can result in grave injustices to individuals," Commissioner O'Malley said.

Accordingly, the SSA has made the following changes:

If a Social Security beneficiary fails to respond to a request for repayment, SSA will now withhold 10 percent of the beneficiary's benefit. Previously, SSA had been withholding 100 percent. The new percentage is similar to the current rate in the Supplemental Security Income (SSI) program.

SSA will reframe its guidance and procedures to shift the burden of proof away from the claimant in determining whether there

is any evidence that the claimant was at fault in causing the overpayment.

For the vast majority of beneficiaries who request a repayment plan, the changed policy will approve plans lasting up to 60 months. To qualify, Social Security beneficiaries only need to provide a verbal summary of their income, resources, and expenses; recipients of the needs-based SSI program would not need to even provide this summary. Overall, this change extends the repayment option by an additional two years (from 36 months to 60 months).

SSA will make it much easier for overpaid beneficiaries to request a waiver of repayment in the event they believe they are without any fault and/or without the ability to repay.

Tax Bill Update

The 2024 Borough and County tax bills have been mailed. If you make your tax payment by April 1, 2024, you'll enjoy a 2% discount. If you haven't received your tax bill, don't hesitate to get in touch with the tax office on either Monday or Wednesday.



Please note:

- 1. The tax office does not accept cash payments.
- 2. Please ensure to include your folio number on your payment.
- 3. Bounced checks will incur a \$50.00 fee.
- 4. If you leave a payment in the tax office, remember to include your name and contact number.
- 5. Borough tax payments cannot be made in installments.
- 6. The tax office is open Mondays and Wednesdays from 10:00 AM to 2:00 PM.

Exciting update: The income eligibility limit for the Property Tax/Rent Rebate program has been increased for both homeowners and renters to \$45,000. Additionally, the maximum rebate for seniors and disabled individuals has been raised to \$1,000.



Get Outside for Some Spring Safety Shape-Ups

Ready for spring? After such a tough winter, we all are. But before we can fully enjoy springtime, we may first need to clean up some of the damage caused by winter. You can prepare for the upcoming season with these spring home maintenance tips.

EXTERIOR AREA OF YOUR HOME

Siding and Roofing: Check your siding and roofing for loose materials, chipped paint, and rot. Look for areas where caulking has weathered away, such as around the chimney. Call a roofing expert when necessary.

Deep Cracks: Cracks in sidewalks and driveways can pose tripping hazards. Seal the cracks with concrete or mortar to prevent tripping hazards.

Standing Water: Drain any areas where water collects and attracts mosquitoes or causes a backup. Be sure to clear drains of debris.

Outdoor Home Lighting: If you discover lighting that is not working despite changing light bulbs and checking the fuse box, you may have a short in the line caused by moisture, which will require the expertise of an electrician. Don't use it to prevent an electrical fire.

Lawn: Once the danger of frost has passed, rake your grass and give it the first fertilization of the season. It will really spruce up your landscape.
