From the Mayor's Desk

Celebrating Freedom Day: Flag Day and Juneteenth

My fellow Yeadonites, I want to take this time to explain the purpose of our recently celebrated "Freedom Day" on June 20. Yeadon has traditionally held a robust Flag Day celebration due to the fact that one of its main architects, William T. Kerr was living in Yeadon when President Harry S. Truman invited him to the White House in 1949 to witness the signing of the Flag Day Legislation (established every year as June 14). He had lobbied every American president from William McKinley to Harry Truman for the flag to have a specially recognized day of celebration.

Yes, others championed the cause along the way, but Mr. Kerr was certainly one of the most prominent in this movement, hence, the White House recognized him while living here in Yeadon. This proud historical moment catapulted Yeadon into the annals of history (and yes, we're famous for other things notwithstanding, such as the historic Nile Swim Club, which will be a story for another day).



With Flag Day and Juneteenth taking place just days apart, we now have two events to celebrate in the same week.

So when Juneteenth was recently established as a national holiday to be observed on June 19th, this pitted Flag Day (recognized on June 14 annually), with Juneteenth, which is now recognized on June 19th annually. In essence, we now have two major events to celebrate during the same week. Juneteenth is certainly important in that the Emancipation Proclamation signed into law by President Abraham Lincoln to abolish slavery in 1863, didn't reach the entire land until that date two years later in 1865. This marked the official end of the scourge of slavery in our land, hence our long-awaited freedom was finally realized by law.

Let us keep in mind, that President Lincoln traveled to our Commonwealth of Pennsylvania to deliver what's known as "the Gettysburg Address" in 1863. This was the decisive battle of the Civil War which enabled Slavery to be abol-

NOTICES

During a storm, it is possible that you may lose power. Please be sure to have water, a flashlight, and nonperishable food available in case of a power outage. In addition, please stay away from down power lines and assume they are charged.

In the event of an outage or down lines, please contact PECO's Emergency line at (800) 841-4141 or their customer service line at (800) 494-4000 to report the issue. You may also report or check status of an outage at peco.com/outages. There is an app as well that you can download from the app store, just search for PECO.

Illegal dumping at the gateway area where Yeadon and Philadelphia connect should be reported to the Borough and/or the Philadelphia Streets Department. The Philadelphia Streets Department can be reached at (215) 686-5560. Call 9-1-1 for any sewer issues, street parking violations, stray animals, and emergency issues.

Parking violations on the common alleys/driveways and neglected lawn maintenance should be reported to the Code Department.

All issues related to street sweeping, highway maintenance (street signs, traffic signals, potholes, etc.), down electrical wires, trees, Snow Removal (Borough-owned lots and streets) should be reported to the Public Works Department.

If you need to dispose of appliances with freon (white goods) such as refrigerators, air conditioners, etc. call Borough Hall to schedule a pickup. Residents must pay a fee of \$10.

Please be informed that B&L Disposal will pick up one bulk item per household on your scheduled trash collection day. If you have any issues with trash or recycling call the Borough Hall.

If you need to replace your recycle bin, they are available for purchase at Borough Hall on the third floor. Residents must pay a fee of \$20.

As we move into the Spring season, the Borough of Yeadon would like to remind residents and business owners of important property maintenance and code enforcement updates to help keep our community clean, safe, and well-maintained.

Trash & Cleanouts

Residents are reminded that excessive trash accumulation is not permitted. If you are completing a cleanout or disposing of large amounts of waste, please consider renting a dumpster. This helps prevent trash from being left behind by collection services and keeps our neighborhoods clean.

Spring Property Maintenance

With warmer weather here, property upkeep is essential:

- Grass must be maintained under 10 inches
- Hedges and shrubs should be trimmed regularly

- Trees must not block or interfere with sidewalks or walkways
- Let's work together to keep Yeadon looking its best!

Business Owners - Important Update

All business owners are now required to obtain a Use & Occupancy (U&O) Inspection annually, per the newly adopted ordinance. Please ensure your property remains compliant. For further information please contact the Code Department at (610) 284-1606.

Property owners sharing driveways are responsible for proper maintenance, including repairing potholes to ensure safe access.

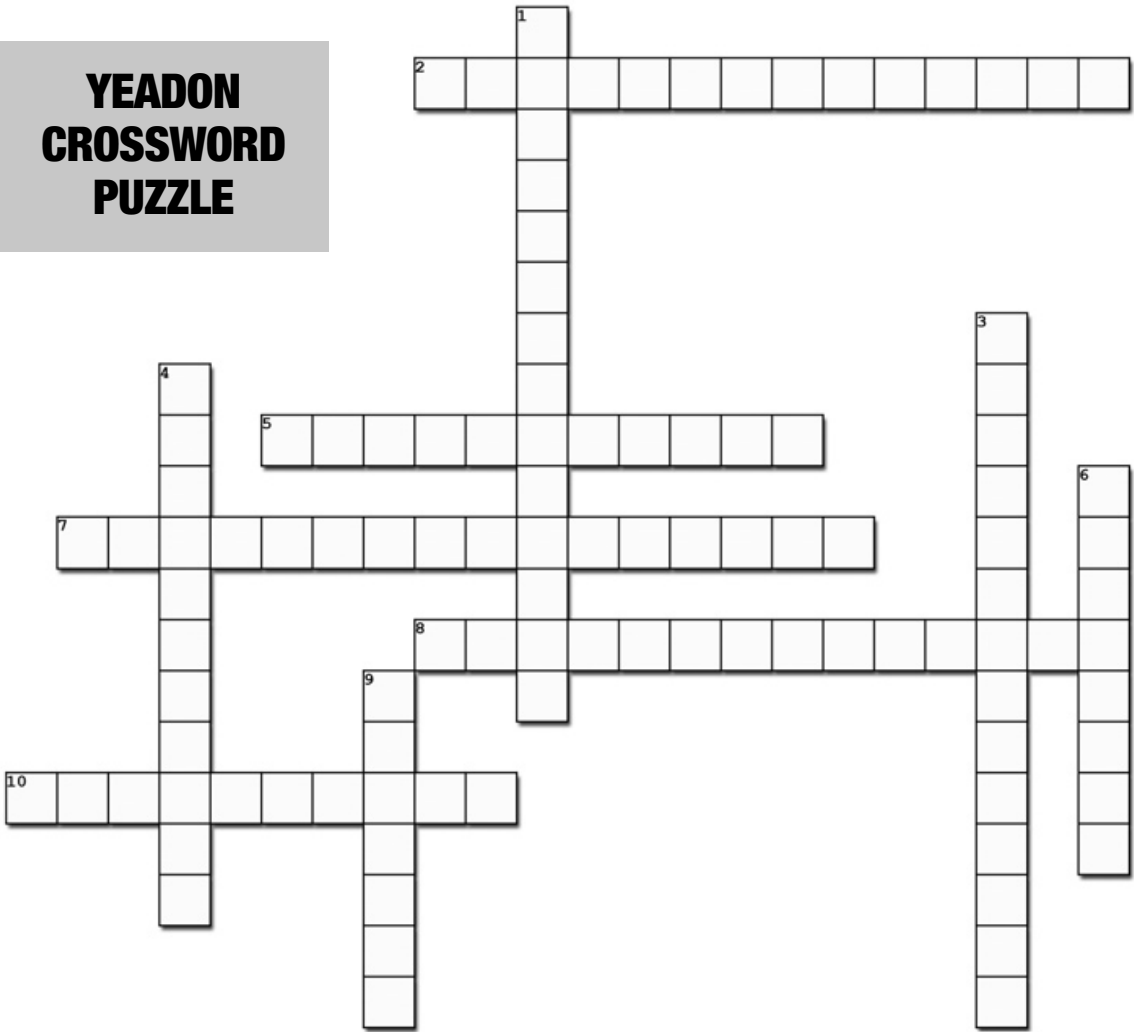
FRIENDLY CODE REMINDERS

Front Hedges:
According to Borough Ordinance §226-2, Section D(5), front hedges may not exceed a height of **4 feet**, which must match the height of the front fence.

Tarped/Abandoned Vehicles:
Per Borough Ordinance §220-69, Section D, all abandoned and/or tarped vehicles on the property must have a valid permit, which can be obtained from the Borough Office on the 3rd floor.

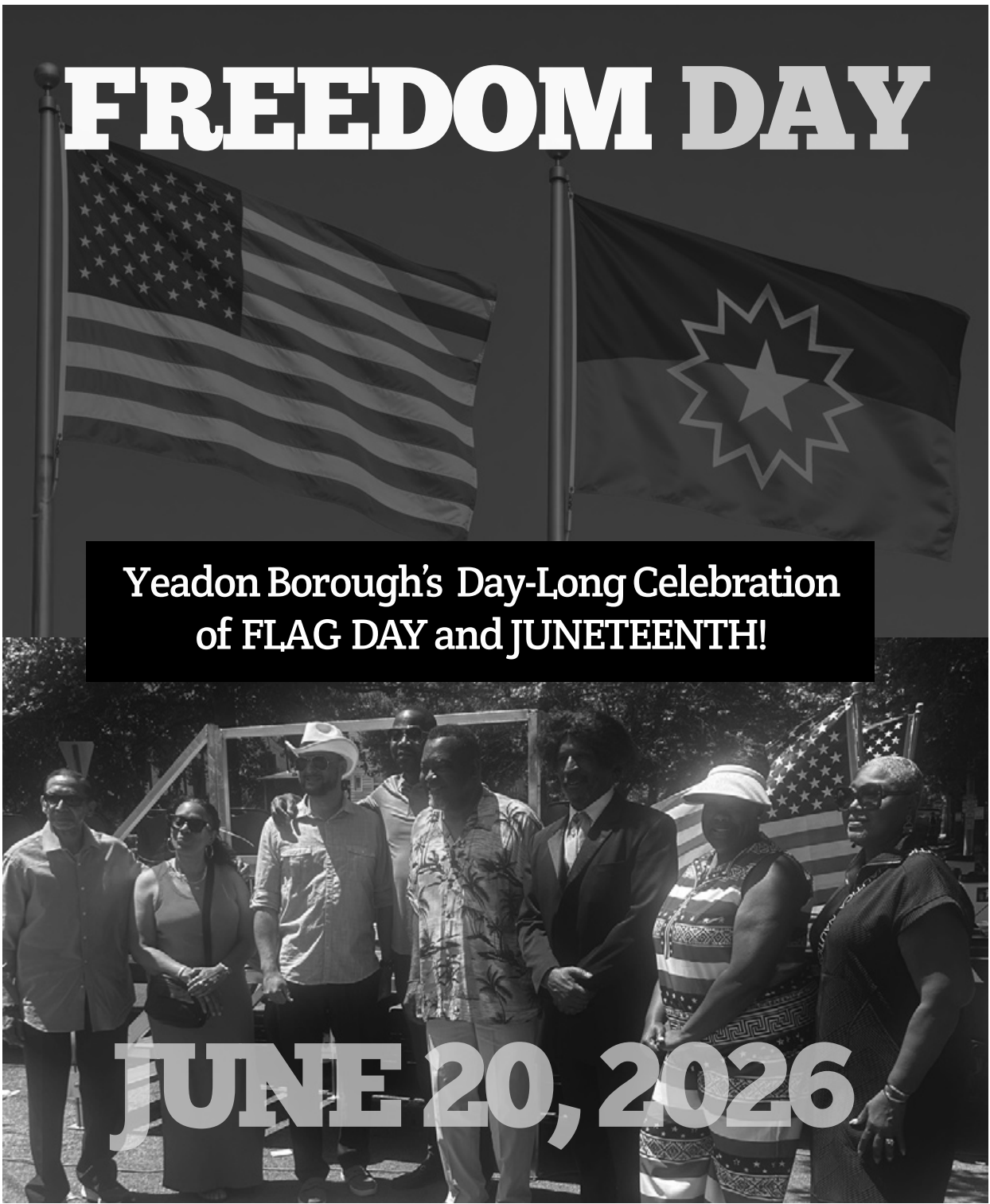
A Great Day for Yeadon

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ished as an institution throughout the land. Regardless of our current views of the flag, the significance of that address leading up to the Emancipation Proclamation, and thereafter, Juneteenth, meant that the American Flag would now be renewed at Gettysburg to symbolize a free republic. Hence the Confederate States as well as the Confederate Flag, would be reincorporated into one flag of The United States of America, becoming a united country again: One Flag - One Union - One Freedom!

Although many may not make that connection, our Commonwealth is the most historical state in the union regarding the Flag. The first flag was said to have been officially made here by Betsy Ross (who was interred at our historic Mr. Moriah Cemetery). Then, Abraham Lincoln renewed the Flag of the United States here at Gettysburg, Pennsylvania, symbolizing freedom after a bloody Civil War. Later, one of Flag Day's pioneers, a Yeadonite, was invited by President Truman to witness the

legislation signing that annually established Flag Day as June 14 in our nation. So now that history has caught up with the times, our leadership thought it prudent to combine both celebrations into one holistic "Freedom Day" where both the Flag as well as the official end of slavery on Juneteenth can be appropriately recognized in tandem, as we wouldn't be able to do justice to both in a grand celebration individually, within the same week.

So, I wanted to take the time to explain the historical context of these two events, and how Yeadon fits into this historical vortex. We can appropriately honor both events by linking them, as they are now officially observed during the same week, but are historically intertwined in significance. On that note, I hope you enjoyed our Freedom Day, and if not, I hope you can participate in future observances. Please continue to be an active part of our community by attending our many events and meetings. Also, please stay safe throughout the summer as we enter the fall and winter months in earnest.

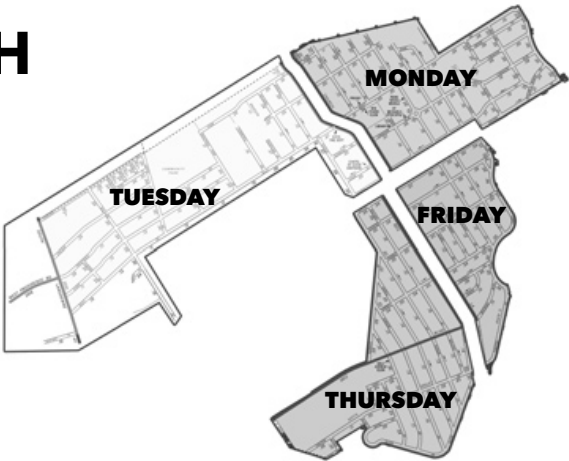

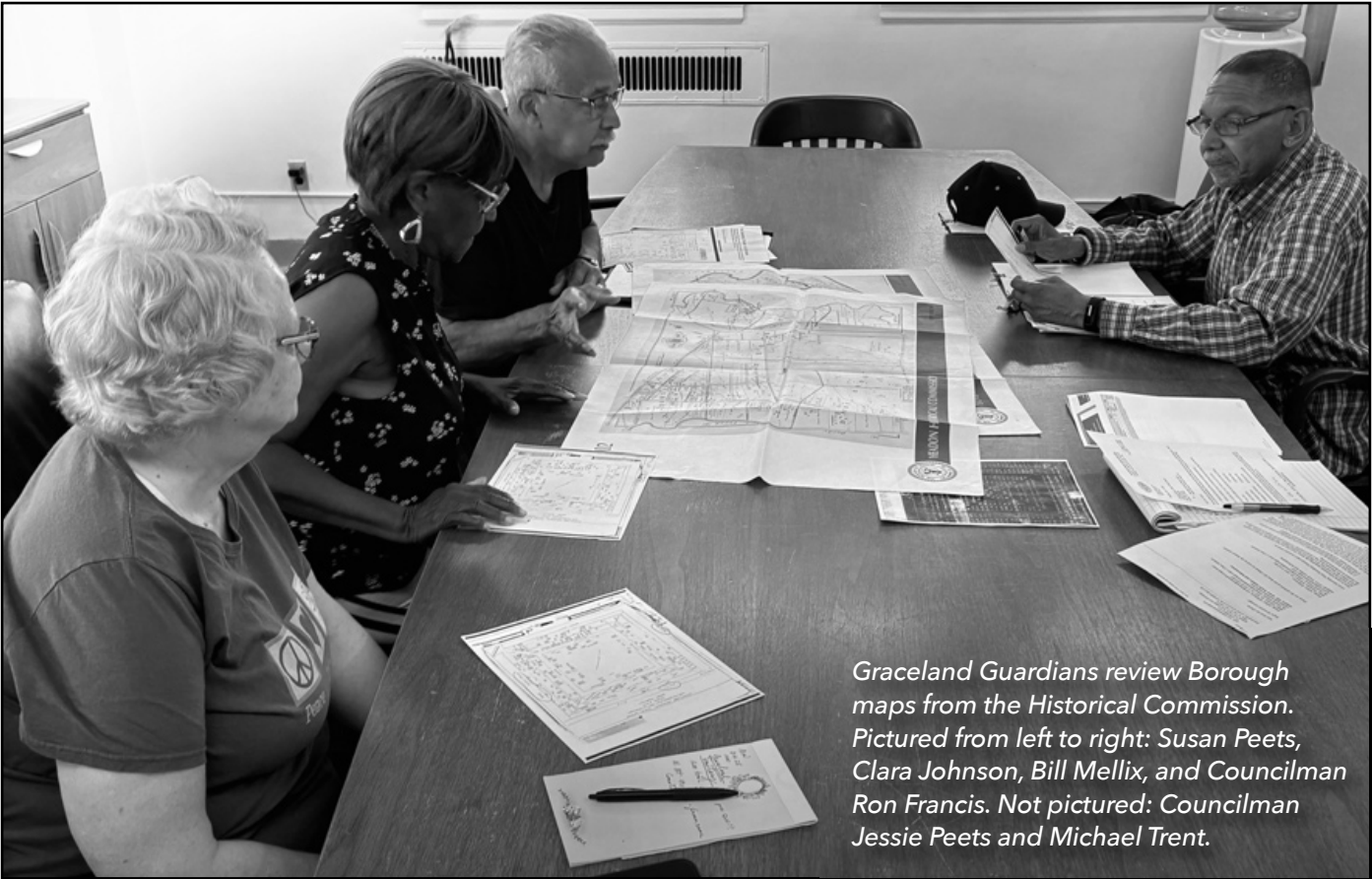
